

Home & Community Care

When faced with funding shortages that led to a waitlist for certain services that our area is unaccustomed to, we found creative ways to serve those in the greatest need to the best of our ability. Our Golden Gaps program allowed us to help 12 people with everything from simple home modifications and maintenance to vehicle modifications. A new Community Health Worker helped find solutions for individuals in danger of emergency room visits, hospitalizations, or nursing facility placement through technological support, setting up online grocery orders, bill pay, accessing medical records, connecting with mental health resources, assisting with transitions to long term care to avoid homelessness, and more! Caregiving is a tough job, and *LifeTime* realizes that caregivers can feel overwhelmed, burned out, and alone. Monthly support groups and respite care increased direct support to caregivers, and a Care Consultant certificate enabled us to begin offering evidence-based care coaching to caregivers as well. Dementia Live! has helped caregivers experience what it is like to have dementia, enabling a better understanding and care for loved ones living with the disease. Additionally, *LifeTime* is now a certified site for memory screenings.



Nutrition

Our Produce for Better Health program allowed us to provide 6,748 pounds of fresh produce to 48 individuals that attend our Senior Nutrition Activity Centers (SNAC) and supplemented the 6,169 meals provided to 141 individuals. SNAC participants were also able to take part in a digital literacy program which helped them better utilize their electronic devices. SNACs provide more than just a meal – they offer opportunities to engage in activities, connect with friends, and access routine health checks.



Catch-A-Ride

CAR entered 2025 facing a severe driver shortage that limited service availability. While a focused hiring effort improved staffing levels, a national side curtain airbag recall temporarily removed 40% of the fleet from service. Despite these challenges, *CAR* achieved 1% growth in total trips provided by year's end. We were fortunate to secure multiple grants that supported key operational and program improvements. Vehicles are now equipped with camera systems that enhance safety by monitoring driver performance, supporting incident review, and recognizing safe, defensive driving. Technology upgrades also allowed *CAR* to transition from one tablet per vehicle to individual tablets for each driver—strengthening data security, expanding access to training, and improving overall efficiency. Additional grant support enhanced outreach efforts through updated print and digital marketing materials, including new client testimonial videos now featured on our website and Facebook page.



Sentry Services

Sentry Services provided court appointed adult guardianship to individuals with complex medical, legal, and social needs, bringing on 10 new clients. At year-end, 19 individuals remained on the waitlist, underscoring the ongoing need for guardianship services within the community.

Guardianship interventions stabilized individuals facing immediate risk when family support was absent or unsafe. In one case, an individual experiencing homelessness was hospitalized and not expected to survive; guardianship ensured safe discharge planning and appropriate placement rather than a return to living in a vehicle. In another, guardianship was established after a client's mother passed away in the home, allowing coordination with partners to secure stable housing. Care Managers also corrected an unsupported medical diagnosis through evaluation and intervened in cases of financial exploitation to secure assets and pursue recovery of misappropriated resources.

Housing

Dillsboro Village Apartments (DVA) completed AHP-funded renovations, including sprinkler upgrades, new ceiling tiles, and LED lighting in common areas. *LifeTime* Housing Group secured more than \$2.5 million in grant funding to develop North Dearborn Village III, an 11-unit affordable senior housing project, set to begin in 2026. To support operations, an occasional maintenance employee was hired to support unit turnover. NDV turned over 14 units and maintained 97% occupancy, while DVA turned over seven units and maintained 98% occupancy. Both properties continue to host Senior Nutrition Activity Centers (SNAC) for residents and the broader community.
